# **SURVEY OF BUSINESS**

### **CURRENT EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS**

- Employment and wage estimates by industry
- Measures jobs not number of people employed
- Excludes most agriculture,
  - self-employed, family, military and rail workers

# **SURVEY OF HOUSEHOLDS**

### LOCAL AREA UNEMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

- Unemployment, employment and labor force levels
   by geographic region
- Measures people employed not number of jobs
- Excludes individuals not in the labor force



# TYPES OF ANALYSIS DISCUSSED

## **MONTH-OVER-MONTH**

- Numeric/Percentage Change
- Influence of seasonal trends are included
- <u>Main Use</u>: Compare changes with previous years in the same month – comparison of previous years

# **YEAR-OVER-YEAR**

- Numeric/Percentage Change
- Removes influence of seasonal trends
- Main Use: Compare changes with previous time periods – long-term trends (growing, declining, accelerating, or decelerating)

## Annual Benchmarking and Revisions

- Revisions to historical Current Employment Survey (CES) and Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) estimates are completed annually for every U.S. state
- CES Nonfarm employment estimates are benchmarked to Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) employment estimates
- LAUS employment and unemployment estimates are revised to reflect new Census population controls, updated input data, and re-estimation
- Revisions primarily affect estimates produced in the last two calendar years, but occasionally minor revisions can impact estimates for the entire historical series

- Upward revisions to 2021 and 2022 Nonfarm employment
  - 2022: Total Nonfarm Employment
    - revised up 28,100 jobs annually
    - revised up 20,100 jobs in December 2022
  - 2021: Total Nonfarm Employment
    - revised up 13,100 jobs annually
    - revised up 29,600 jobs in December 2021

# MONTH-OVER-MONTH (MoM) HIGHLIGHTS

- The Arizona seasonally adjusted (SA) unemployment rate decreased to 3.8% in January 2023 from 4.0% in December 2022
- The U.S. SA unemployment rate decreased to 3.4% in January 2023 from 3.5% in December 2022
- Arizona not seasonally adjusted (NSA) nonfarm employment decreased by 32,600 jobs
  - Job losses of this magnitude are typical in January following the hiring increase that occurred during the 2022 holiday season
  - Job gains were recorded in Government (2,700 jobs) and Natural Resources and Mining (200 jobs)
  - The largest job losses were recorded in Trade, Transportation and Utilities (-16,500 jobs) and Professional and Business Services (-6,400 jobs)



# YEAR-OVER-YEAR (YoY) HIGHLIGHTS

- Arizona NSA nonfarm employment increased by 98,400 jobs (3.2%)
- Arizona private sector employment increased by 90,700 jobs (3.4%), while government employment increased by 7,700 jobs (1.9%)
- All eleven major sectors recorded job gains
  - The largest gains were recorded in Private Education and Health Services\* (26,100 jobs), Professional and Business Services (18,700 jobs), Leisure and Hospitality (18,100 jobs)
- All seven Arizona metro areas (MSAs) gained jobs
  - The largest percentage gains were recorded in Flagstaff MSA (4.5%), Prescott MSA (4.1%), and Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale MSA (3.5%)

\*The previously titled Education and Health Services sector was renamed to the Private Education and Health Services. Employment as previously defined for this industry did not change.

- The Arizona layoffs rate decreased to 0.7% in Dec. 2022 from 1.3% in Nov. 2022
- The Arizona total separations rate decreased to 4.1% in Dec. 2022 from 4.7% in Nov. 2022

### Notable Change:

- In January 2023, the Federal Reserve announced an increase of 0.25 percentage points to the federal funds rate
- On March 7, 2023, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell testified before a U.S. Senate Committee
  - In his remarks, he stated that "the latest economic data have come in stronger than expected, which suggests that the ultimate level of interest rates is likely to be higher than previously anticipated"

  - Energy prices rose 8.7% YoY
  - Food prices rose 10.1% YoY
  - Transportation prices rose 3.8%
     YoY
  - Housing prices rose 8.2% YoY
- Phoenix MSA CPI increased 9.5% YoY in December 2022
  - Energy prices declined 1.0% YoY
  - Food prices rose 10.6% YoY
  - Transportation prices rose 14.6% YoY
  - Housing prices rose 15.4% YoY

  - o All eleven major sectors recorded job gains
  - o All seven Arizona metro areas gained jobs
- The Arizona SA unemployment rate decreased to 3.8% in January 2023
- The Arizona SA labor force increased by 7,783 individuals month-over-month
