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ABOUT THIS REPORT

This report was created to assist Arizona Local Workforce Development Areas in completing their 2020-2024 Local Workforce Development Plans. The report summarizes key demographic, labor market, and workforce trends in the state and local economy. The information provided in this report is intended to be a resource for local workforce information board members and workforce practitioners during the local workforce planning process.

ABOUT THE ARIZONA OFFICE OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) was created to strengthen the analytical capabilities of the state's workforce and economic development initiatives. OEO serves as Arizona's workforce planning coordinator, and in this role, provides operational, strategic and research support to the Workforce Arizona Council and other key workforce partners. OEO produces official statewide data for population, employment, and wage estimates including the official Arizona employment and population projections. OEO also functions in an advisory capacity by providing economic expertise to state and local government agencies and officials.

OVERVIEW

Yuma County's economy includes a wide range of industries offering opportunities for individuals seeking employment of all types.

Several positive economic and workforce trends were recorded in Yuma County including:

- Population continues to increase, growing 0.9 percent annually from 2013 to 2018.
- Population is projected to grow by 1.5 percent in 2019 and 1.4 percent in 2020.
- Labor force participation grew in 2018, increasing by 1,929 people, or 2.0 percent from 2017.
- From 2017 to 2018, all ten of the ten major industry sectors recorded positive year-over-year employment growth.
- In 2018, employment gains were led by Education and Health Services, which grew by 626 jobs or 4.0 percent, and Manufacturing, which grew by 358 jobs or 6.8 percent from 2017.
- Within Yuma County, total employment is projected to increase by 1.4% annually from Q3 2018 through Q2 2020.
- From 2017 to 2018, the percentage of Yuma residents with a high school diploma or higher increased.
- The share of Yuma residents with a bachelor's degree or higher increased from 13.9 percent in 2013 to 16.8 in 2018.

Other less favorable economic and workforce challenges were recorded in Yuma County include:

- Since 2009, Yuma County's unemployment rate has been dramatically higher than Arizona and the United States.
- Yuma's median household income decreased in 2018 to \$43,403 from \$46,798 in 2017.
- Yuma County had a substantially higher rate of families in poverty (16 percent), when compared with the state's rate (10 percent).

Changes in population can have a large impact on a local economy. An area experiencing population growth, particularly growth in working-age populations, may experience an increase in economic activity¹ and workforce diversity.

- Arizona had one of the fastest growing populations in the United States from 2013-2017, ranking 9th among all U.S. states
- Yuma County represented nearly 2 percent of Arizona's total population growth from 2013 to 2018.
- In both 2017 and 2018, Yuma County represented 3 percent of Arizona's total population.

Population projections provide useful insight into an area's future demand for resources and services.² An area experiencing population declines may choose to focus efforts on filling current job positions, while an area experiencing population growth may choose to focus on job creation. Further analysis into the composition of growing or declining populations can be a useful next step.

- Arizona is projected to add more than 406,032 people to its population from 2019-2022, growing by an annualized rate of 1.0 percent.
- Yuma County population is projected to add 12,948 people to its overall population from 2019-2022, representing 3.2 percent of total projected population growth for the state.
- A majority of Yuma County's population growth, roughly 58%, is projected to come from people migrating into the county from other Arizona counties, U.S. states or foreign countries.

area with population characteristics that are significantly different than state or national averages, may need to consider specific approaches on how to best meet the needs of their unique population.

- Median household income was lower in Yuma County than in Arizona or the United States. Yuma's median household income decreased from \$46,798 in 2017 to \$43,403 in 2018.
- Median age was substantially lower in Yuma County than in Arizona or the United States.
- In Yuma County, veterans represented a larger share of total population than in Arizona or the nation.
- The rate of uninsured people in Yuma County was lower than Arizona's rate. This may be attributed to Yuma County's AHCCCS utilization being dramatically higher than Arizona or national rates.
- The labor force participation rate was substantially lower in Yuma County when compared with Arizona or the United States.
- Yuma County's households in poverty was substantially higher than the national or state rate.

- Yuma County had a dramatically higher rate of SNAP and AHCCCS utilization when compared with the state.
- Over a quarter of Yuma residents are on AHCCCS, nearly double the rate of the United States.

Understanding the current educational attainment of your local area's available workforce is a crucial step in identifying job seeker and business needs. Education is an important element in determining job success, and, oftentimes, can lead to higher-paying jobs and lower rates of unemployment.³


- Yuma residents 25 and older with a high school diploma (75.6 percent) is below the statewide rate (87.5 percent). However, in 2018, the percentage of Yuma residents with a high school diploma or higher increased from 72.3 percent in 2017.
- The percentage of Yuma residents with lower than a high school diploma decreased from 28.3 percent in 2017 to 24.4 percent in 2018.
- The share of Yuma residents with a bachelor's degree or higher increased from 13.9 percent in 2013 to 16.8 in 2018.


Unemployment Rate Comparisons, Sept. 2009-Sept. 2019, Not-Seasonally Adjusted

- Over the past ten years, Yuma County's unemployment rate has remained dramatically higher than the statewide and national rate.
- Over the past ten years, Yuma County has had the highest unemployment rate of any county in Arizona.
- Despite high unemployment the number of people in Yuma County's labor force increased from an average of 95,707 in 2017, to 97,636 in 2018.
- In 2018, there was an average of 16,639 unemployed individuals in Yuma County.

Unemployment Rate by Educational Attainment, 2018, Ages 25-64





Historically, higher educational attainment levels lead to lower levels of unemployment.⁴ Understanding the relationship between unemployment and education can help determine which education levels are most in need of targeted workforce efforts.

- Unemployment rates for individuals in Yuma County without a high school diploma was nearly double the statewide or national rate.
- For individuals with a high school diploma or higher, the unemployment rate is lower for those in Yuma County than Arizona overall.

- Average total nonfarm employment increased 5,100 jobs from 2009 to 2018, an annualized increase of 1.1 percent over this period. Over this same period, Arizona average total nonfarm employment increased by an annual average of 1.8 percent.
- Despite a high unemployment rate, nonfarm job growth has trended closely to statewide job growth.

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- Industries with the highest annualized percentage growth was led by Manufacturing (7.8 percent) and Professional and Business Services (3.0 percent).
- From 2013 to 2018, Trade, Transportation, and Utilities had the largest increase in the amount of people.
