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ABOUT THIS REPORT

This report was created to assist Arizona Local Workforce Development Areas in completing their 2020-2024 Local Workforce Development Plans. The report summarizes key demographic, labor market, and workforce trends occurring within the state and local economy. The information provided in this report is intended to be a resource for local workforce information board members and workforce practitioners during the local workforce planning process.

ABOUT THE ARIZONA OFFICE OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) was created to strengthen the analytical capabilities of the state's workforce and economic development initiatives. OEO produces official statewide data for population, employment, and wage estimates including the official Arizona employment and population projections. OEO also functions in an advisory capacity by providing economic expertise to state and local government agencies and officials.

Changes in population can have a large impact on a local economy. An area experiencing population growth, particularly growth in working-age populations, may experience an increase in economic development activity¹ and workforce diversity.

- **Population:** The Nineteen Tribal Nations is comprised of 84,251 people. 73 percent of the population is over 16 years of age.
- **Labor Force:** The Nineteen Tribal Nations have a labor force participation rate of 49 percent. The Nineteen Tribal Nations' labor force participation rate is lower than Arizona labor force participation rate of 60 percent.
- **Unemployment Rate:** The Nineteen Tribal Nations have a combined unemployment rate of 18.6 percent, higher than the statewide unemployment rate of 6.5 percent.

It is important to understand the employment barriers faced by those served when developing workforce strategies. Population characteristics can help illuminate vulnerable segments of an area's population.

- **Median Household Income**: Across the Nineteen Tribal Nations, the average median household income was \$31,900, lower than the median household income in Arizona.
- **Families in Poverty**: On average, a third of families within the Nineteen Tribal Nations are in poverty. This is more than the statewide rate of 12 percent.
- **Health Insurance:** On average, 19 percent of residents within the Nineteen Tribal Nations do not have insurance, higher than the statewide rate of 11 percent.

Understanding the current educational attainment of your local area's available workforce is a crucial step in identifying job seeker and business needs. Education is an important element in determining job success, and, oftentimes, can lead to higher-paying jobs and lower rates of unemployment.²

- The average rate of Bachelor's degree or higher completers among the Nineteen Tribal Nations is 8 percent, lower than the statewide rate of 29 percent.
- The average rate of high school graduate completers among the Nineteen Tribal Nations is 75 percent, lower than the statewide rate of 87 percent.



• Service occupations account for the largest share of total employment within the Nineteen Tribal Nations followed management and business occupations and sales and office occupations.

- The most common industry within the Nineteen Tribal Nations is Education Services, and Health Care Services; followed by Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation; and Accommodation and Food Services.
- The prominence of Health Care and Social Assistance within the Nineteen Tribal Nation overlaps with the prominence of Healthcare and Social Assistance at the statewide level; where the industry is ranked second among all in-demand industries.
- The top ranked statewide in-demand industry, Construction, comprises a small share of employment within the Nineteen Tribal Nations.



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
