The BEAD Challenge Process is the way in which the Arizona Commerce Authority will determine the unserved, underserved, and served status of every home, business, and community anchor institution in the state. Unserved and underserved locations will be eligible to be connected through BEAD funded projects.

- 2. Select the desired location(s) associated with the challenge and identify the challenge type (i.e. availability, speed, etc.)
- 3. Upload evidence to support your challenge

- 4. Submit your challenge. The deadline to submit challenges is May 14, 2024.

Challenge Process Timeline

- March 1, 2024 Challenge Process Portal Available for Registration
- March 15, 2024 Challenge Process Submission Starts and Rebuttal Starts on a Rolling Basis. Service Providers will have 15 calendars from a notification of a challenge to provide a rebuttal
- May 14, 2024 Challenge Process Submission Ends
- May 15, 2024 June 30, 2024 Final Determination Phase

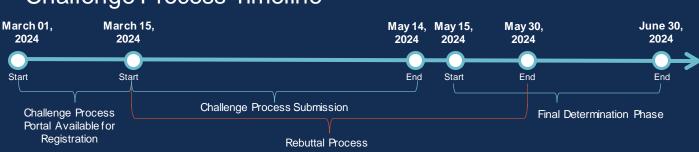
